

Is It Deposit-Bearing?

Please take note of the following beverage products for which we receive many inquiries.

	 <p>Tim Hortons – Icedcapp</p> <p><u>Iced coffee drinks are deposit-bearing since April 1, 2020.</u></p>	 <p>Icee Slush</p> <p><u>This is in a ready-to-drink form - similar to other juices in pouches even though it is frozen. Such beverages are deposit-bearing.</u></p>	 <p>Fruit of the Earth Aloe Vera Juice</p> <p><u>This is in a ready-to-drink form. Says on the label it does not need to be diluted – though it can be. Qualifies thus as a “beverage” and is deposit-bearing.</u></p>
	 <p>Starbucks Cold Brew Coffee Concentrate</p> <p><u>Concentrates (need to be diluted or mixed prior to drinking) are excluded from the program. No deposit.</u></p>	 <p>Tazo Chai Latte Black Tea Concentrate</p> <p><u>Concentrates (need to be diluted or mixed prior to drinking) are excluded from the program. No deposit.</u></p>	 <p>Baileys Coffee Creamer</p> <p><u>Similar to concentrates, creamers are excluded from the program. No deposit.</u></p>
